It has been an eventful few months for the Walter Reed Society with numerous in-house opportunities to support patients, families and staff as well as activities by our partners. Frequent readers of our newsletter will know that for several years the Society has been providing grants to other local nonprofits that support military patients and families. You also know that on occasion we support others organizations that are not so local but that support the military and their families. These non-local organizations are always well known to at least one Board member. Many of our activities in this regard are addressed within this newsletter; I encourage you to spent some time learning all that is being done.

At our Annual Meeting this past May, CAPT Melissa Austin, WRNMMC Director, spoke of the many efforts that are being made to increase patient care at the hospital. These efforts are somewhat in response to the Deputy Secretary of Defense's December 6, 2023 memo — Stabilizing and Improving the Military Health System. There are numerous reasons why the military healthcare system is in its current situation, short of staff and short of patients. The DEPSEC's memo has drawn attention to these and hopefully will result in improvements.

The Society was honored to help arrange the presentation and placement at WRNMMC of a maquette of the Viet Nam Women's Memorial located on the National Mall. Along with the American Red Cross the Society presented the second Rose Mologne Award to Red Cross Volunteer Pat Gross. Follow-on articles and photos of both events are included. We have received a number of thank you letters from the hospital staff as well as others we support.

This edition also has articles on some of the other organizations we support either with financial grants or via consultation and advice. These include Friends of USU, Leashes of Valor, Blue Star Families, and the American Health Information Management Association Foundation's scholarship program. Also there is an image of our 2024 Holiday Collectible honoring the 100th anniversary of the Statue of Liberty becoming a National Monument.

Sadly the Society has become aware that in the past few months several Society members have passed away. Past Society President MG (Ret) Enrique Mendez, members BG (Ret) Van Coots, LTC (Ret) Sherman Ragland are the deaths that we know about. A Past President of the Walter Reed Society, Enrique (Hank) Méndez, Jr., passed away May 16, 2024; he was 92. A beloved and respected leader in military medicine for decades, he was a gentle and kind soul. Born in Santurce, Puerto Rico he graduated from Stritch School of Medicine of Loyola University in Chicago. He served in the U.S. Army Medical Corps for 28 years, retiring in the permanent rank of Major General. He served as Deputy Surgeon General of the Army and finally the Commanding General of Walter Reed Army Medical Center, Washington, DC.

After retiring from the Army, Dr. Méndez returned to his native Puerto Rico to become, first the Dean, and subsequently, the Dean and President of the Ponce School of Medicine. He then served as Medical Director of Damas Hospital in Ponce before becoming Secretary of Health of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico. In December 1989, President George H.W. Bush nominated him to

be Assistant Secretary of Defense for Health Affairs. He served in this position until January 1993. He later became a partner in the health care consulting firm Martin, Blanck and Associates.

Dr. Méndez was a Diplomate of the American Board of Internal Medicine and a Fellow of the American College of Physicians. His awards and decorations as well as honorary doctoral degrees are to numerous to detail here.

He is survived by his wife of many decades, Olga; a son, two daughters and their families, six grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

To say "Thank You for Your Service" does not seem adequate for all that he gave to us. He was a revered leader, mentor and friend. Sir, you will be missed. \star



Walter Reed Society member Brigadier General (Ret.) Norvell (Van) Coots died on June 12, 2024 as a result of injuries sustained in a horseback riding incident. He was 65 years old.

Dr. Coots, a dermatologist, retired as a Brigadier General from the U.S. Army in 2016. He was the final Commander, Walter Reed Healthcare System from 2008 – 2011. He culminated his 36 years of military service as the Commanding General of Regional Health Command Europe, while concurrently serving as the Command Surgeon for the US Army Europe and 7th Army. He was also Deputy Commanding General of the US Army Medical Command, Assistant Surgeon General for Force Projection at the Pentagon, and Surgeon, US Forces Afghanistan.


After retirement from the Army he became President and CEO of Holy Cross Health and the Maryland Region of Trinity Health. He held a number of other leadership roles to include Chairman of the Board, Maryland Physicians Care; Chairman of the Board, National Institutes of Health Clinical Center; and Board Member, American Hospital Association. His awards and recognitions are to numerous to be included here.

He is survived by his wife, Claudia; two teenage children — Maximillan and Catalina; a sister — Elizabeth Early; a stepsister — Dr. Denise Holland; and a host of extended family and friends. He will be sorely missed by all who knew and loved him.

Sherman L. Ragland LTC U.S. Army (Ret)

Walter Reed Society member Sherman L Ragland, LTC US Army (Retired) died on July 10, 2024. He was 90 years old.

He graduated from Central State University in 1956 and was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant in the United States Army. He later earned the Master of Social Work Degree from The Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C. From 1968-1976 he served three commanding generals at Walter Reed Army Medical Center where he pioneered several U.S. Army social work and Army Medical Corps initiatives.

Upon retiring from the Army he worked at the

National Institutes of Health, where he retired as the Deputy Associate Director for Special Populations. He served as the President of the Alumni of the Federal Executive Institute and was a Past President of the National Association of Social Workers.

He is survived by his wife Dr. Delores Parron-Ragland. LTC Ragland is also survived by his three children and six grandchildren. COL Ragland and Dr. Parron-Ragland were enthusiastic supporters of the Walter Reed Society faithfully attending all membership meetings.

He will be greatly missed by all who knew him.



Pat Gross is the second recipient of the Rose Mologne Award in Recognition of Outstanding Service with Excellence in her Red Cross volunteer work at WRNMMC. She was also presented the WRS' Rose Mologne coin. The award honors Rose Mologne, a founding member of WRS and a 40-year American Red Cross volunteer. Rose — who passed away in 2022 —was also the wife of Major General Lew Mologne, former Walter Reed Army Medical Center commander.

Gross has been a Red Cross volunteer since 2010, serving in multiple capacities before taking on the role of Red Cross Office Management Lead. She serves as the welcoming face of the Red Cross at WRNMMC greeting visitors with warmth and professionalism. Her exceptional interpersonal skills and genuine care cre-ate a positive atmosphere for all who enter the office. She plays a pivotal role in managing Red Cross office operations with remark-able organizational skills and attention to detail. She consistently goes the extra mile to support WR patients and all staff.

A NEW 'LEASH' ON LIFE

"We make a difference in the lives of veterans," so when The Leashes of Valor website has photos and testimony we learned about the non-profit organizations that train service dogs, we looked into Leashes of Valor. They offered us another way to reach out to our veterans who have serious challenges," said Dan Bullis, Vice President of Patient Services and Warrior/Family Support.

Leashes of Valor was founded in 2017 by retired Marine Corps Capt. Jason Haag, who suffered from severe symptoms of post-traumatic stress following three deployments to Iraq and Afghanistan. Though he tried

many treatments, it was a service dog named Axel that ultimately changed Haag's life.

"I wanted to give that gift to others," Haag said. Since its founding, Leashes of Valor has successfully paired more than 30 dogs with veterans with PTSD, traumatic brain injuries, and other "unseen wounds" of their military ser-

vice. Though Axel passed away in January 2022, his legacy lives on at Axel's Place, Leashes of Valor's 10-acre property in Fredericksburg, Va.

Leashes of Valor's motto is One Leash Saves Two Lives—the life of a veteran and the life of a dog. That's because whenever possible, canines that enter into the program come from shelters and rescue groups or are owner surrenders.

An estimated 3.2 million dogs are euthanized in the United States every year.

Service dogs share a common, important thread with those in the military.

Intense training is required and key to a successful partnership with the veteran. Service dogs train for up to two years before they are paired with a veteran. The veteran then spends 10 days at Axel's Place learning how to work with their new service dog.

The success, the positive influence each service dog has had on the veterans, is impressive.

from many veterans that capture and communicate the close attachment, the bonding between the veteran and their dog.

The WRS Board of Directors voted to support Leashes of Valor with a significant donation of \$100,000, which covers all costs associated with the two year process of raising and training four service dogs including food, veterinary care, transportation, training, and other expenses.

"We are humbled and grateful for this tremendous donation," said Chris Bowers, program director for Leashes of Valor and a retired Marine who lost his leg in a bomb blast in Iraq.

Bowers credits his service dog with helping him reintegrate into society after the catastrophic injury.

> "This tremendous donation will truly change the lives of veterans who carry the scars of their servicewhether visible or invisible," Bowers said. "But it doesn't end there. These dogs have a ripple effect. They allow veterans to reconnect with their families and take active roles in their communities again."

As part of its sponsorship Leashes of Valor has invited the WRS to name the four dogs to honor those

who have given so much to their country, through their work with the military medical community. Words of the organization at "One Leash Saves Two Lives" summarize this important and valuable effort.

One of the groups we work with is Friends of the Uniformed Services University (FUSU), a group similar to WRS that supports the medical school. For the past two years, John Pierce meets with them monthly to support military medicine within the limitations allowed as non-profits. Led by Tammy Alvarez, FUSU sponsored an event in May at the National Press Club — "Imagine Combat Without Military Medicine" — to call attention to USU's role in military medicine. WRS member LTG (R) Ronald Blanck led the panel discussion. Current Assistant Secretary of Defense (Health Affairs) Lester Martinez-Lopez attended and answered questions about the current state of military medicine. The event received significantly positive reviews including an offer to begin "Military Minute"— a twice daily, two-day-a-week, on-air spot at local radio station, WMAL. The topic— military medicine's role in defending our country — may begin airing this Fall.
